Relationship with the Land is at the heart of what we do, and this Land is Indigenous Land. But the origins of the Child and Nature Alliance of Canada and Forest School Canada are rooted in white settler thinking and approaches. We are an organization currently led by white settlers, headquartered on the unceded traditional territory of the Algonquin Anishinaabe. We have imposed a settler colonial way of being with the Land because our programs were not co-created with Indigenous people. This approach means we perpetuate and benefit from colonization in the ways that we operate, and this causes harm.

We want to repair our relationships with the Indigenous communities, and work towards co-creating trusting, safe, and reciprocal relationships with them. We hope to recreate the Forest and Nature School Practitioners Course, and co-create all future programming with Indigenous partners across Canada. In doing that, we hope that Indigenous and Western worldviews will have equitable voice and space in our programs, so that they are safe, meaningful, and culturally relevant for all participants.



Natural Curiosity (NC) is an environmental education program housed at the Dr. Eric Jackman Institute of Child Study Laboratory School, OISE-University of Toronto. In 2018, NC launched a new resource for educators, Natural Curiosity 2nd Edition: The Importance of Indigenous Perspectives in Children's Environmental Inquiry, which supports a stronger basic awareness of Indigenous perspectives and their importance to environmental education. The driving motivation for a second edition was the burning need, in the wake of strong and unequivocal recommendations by the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, to situate Indigenous perspectives into the heart of Canadian educational settings and curricula, most notably in connection with environmental and outdoor education. NC continues to fulfill this mandate by directly collaborating with Indigenous partners to support educators to incorporate an inquiry-based approach into their teaching practice, connecting children's learning deeply to the natural world.

"It started with a baby...


After I had my first baby in 2013, I knew that I had to take her outside. Part of it was because I wanted her to benefit from vitamin N (nature) but also because I needed it for my own post-partum health. I found that I was happier if I took my baby outside at least once a day and that the crying was not so loud outside.

But, the search for useful trail information and nearby attractions to these trails that benefit families was hard to find. Oftentimes, it did not even exist. I did not want to keep going to the same outdoor spot every day. I also was exhausted and trying to figure out where to go was overwhelming.

I learned that I was not alone.

Other families wanted to learn about these places too, whether it was the best mountain summit for a toddler, great all-terrain stroller-friendly trails, or local gems for ice cream and coffee."

# Indigenous Knowledge: Gathering and Tobacco

We are grateful for the expertise and knowledge shared in these pages. We have also featured a number of special guest authors throughout the Resource Hub to provide a space for them to explore important topics more deeply within the context of outdoor learning. We appreciate their valuable contributions to the community, and hope you enjoy reading each one.

Wherever you are in your teaching journey, learning Indigenous knowledge always takes time. We learn as much as we feel comfortable teaching, or just a little bit at a time. There are certain things that can be taught and there are certain things that cannot be taught. It is a good thing to teach what you learned from an elder who tells you it's ok to teach it: they will say it can be passed onto others and you have the honor to do so. You will know it is ok and they will tell you it is ok to teach this knowledge. It is ok to teach a little bit or as much as you feel comfortable in teaching.

Ways to gain knowledge include: learning from an elder or knowledge keeper from the local Indigenous community; having the teachings since you can remember; conferences or resources; and the many new ways of knowing being developed.

What cannot be taught are sacred ceremonies like sweat lodges or pipe ceremonies. Sacred Sun Dances and sites like the Nose Hill Siksikaitsitapi Medicine Wheel in Calgary need an elder. Families and communities use traditional protocols and sacred songs from the

land to pass on to other families or community members. Indigenous peoples' have the experience, from singing the songs to knowing the different protocols that need to happen for ceremonies to be conducted in a proper and traditional way. One could call upon an elder or knowledge keeper for sacred ceremonies in a school like a feast, a round dance or for smudging.

On the other hand, Sun Dances cannot be conducted by schools, as these ceremonies are from Indigenous families who have the rights to hold Sun Dances at certain times during the summer months. Community members and visitors can view a Sun Dance but need to know when and where they are held, along with some protocols like where to sit. Powwows are always a welcome space for all to enjoy, as are round dances in the fall and winter months.

When it comes to smudging with sacred medicines like sage or sweetgrass, anyone who is properly taught can smudge as long as they know its meaning and how to use the medicine in its proper way such as handling, storage, picking, and protocols. One can have this displayed in the class or school but not left alone for extended periods of time like holidays. Always care for medicines like a baby, and bring

them home with you and care for them like they are alive.

One medicine to use when giving respect back to the land is tobacco. Tobacco is a respected plant given by the creator to give respect back to plants and animals of Mother Earth. We honor the teachings and learning from the land with tobacco. When there is a plan to go outside to explore, give back to the land first using tobacco. It is a respectable protocol to do with everyone. One can grow tobacco and dry the leaves - one can use tobacco from the store but it is better to grow if you can. Then, crush them and store them in a jar or container. Once all are in a circle outside, we take a pinch of tobacco and put it in our left hand (this hand is closest to the heart to which we use to give). We think of good thoughts and give thanks for the learning coming from the plants, animals or anything coming from the land. Place the tobacco on the ground, or by a tree, or in the water as the action of giving back. When we bring in leaves in the fall or are ready to dissect a frog, we will use tobacco to say thank you for the learning. These are just a couple ways of Indigenous knowing, being and doing, integrated into your learning journey.



"Observe me, says the Breath, and learn to live effortlessly in the Present Moment. Feel me, says the Breath, and feel the Ebb and Flow of Life. Allow me, says the Breath, and I'll sustain and nourish you, filling you with energy and cleansing you of tension and fatique"

- Donna Martin (poem excerpt from 'The Breath is Life's Teacher')

It was a brittle winter morning. In the December twilight, my body jittered in anticipation of a World Cup skate sprint event in Davos, Switzerland. Self-doubt made the moment before my start even more restrictive than my spandex race suit. To counter the pressure, I placed the palms of my hands over my belly and drank the cool air in then exhaled out.

"Just.... this....just ....this....," I repeated to myself with each rise and fall of my belly.

Breath by breath, the tension in my chest dissolved and my nervous muscles softened. The cloud of breath hung suspended in the outside air and reminded me of life's wonder; I felt connected to a super power sense of purpose. As a nordic skiing athlete, I trained with

my breath to align body, mind and moment for peak performance.

In my life beyond sport, the breath continues to share many teachings. As a budding Environmental Educator, I no longer need to count the amount of heartbeats in a minute or track my training. Nonetheless, the breath is an incredible teacher in the principles of reciprocity; of give and take; of ebb and flow; of human connection. If we are fortunate to inhale gulps of clean air, we are actively participating in Earth's processes.

In a simple yet profound act, the breath is an environmental educational resource that can turn a moment of tension and humannature disconnect to ease, understanding and belonging. Through my previous work at a nature connection program in Canmore, Alberta, Forest Play, I engaged with breath as a learning resource as one to both calm childrens' minds and as a way to give thanks to the plants for their offerings. Gifting breath to the plants we harvested, from Yarrow to Pine Needles, is a simple act of offering thanks.

In this field of education and time on Earth, it can feel disempowering to learn of the extensive damage humans cause on Earth. Simple attention to the breath, however, is a profound antidote to the negative news because it reminds us of our active participation, belonging and the immense wonder of being alive. When we feel this connection, we remember that human and nonhuman health

my breath to align body, mind and moment for are inseparable. Deep breaths can do wonders.

One hot summer day in July, a herd of five yearolds bolted past me with stained cheeks and wild strawberries in hand. The child leading the charge screeched to a halt like a Bison might do upon discovering a plummeting cliff below. The children trailing closely behind then rammed into the halted child. Wham!

"I forgot!" she exclaimed to her confused and bumped friends. Without explaining, she ran back to the spot where they had just harvested the tiny, plump berry bombs. She then knelt down to the ground, cupped her hands over her mouth, caught an exhalation and lowered her hands to release her breath to the strawberry plant below whispering, "thank you".

In one moment, she demonstrated her plant identification knowledge, the principles of reciprocity, photosynthesis processes, empathy and gratitude.

Whether on the startline of a World Cup race, in the confines of a classroom or exploring a field of wild strawberries, the breath continues to accompany and teach me.

The next time your chest is tight or your students are rambunctious, I invite you to fill your belly with a breath while thinking "just" and exhale thinking "this". Breath by breath, I hope you too will experience the web we all play an important role in.

# A summary of support factors and barriers to outdoor learning in elementary schools: A systemic perspective



Over decades, multiple benefits of outdoor play and learning have been clearly articulated in the research. An unexpected finding, which emerged from our collective experience in a global pandemic, has been a new willingness for elementary school teachers to locate curricular learning outside the classroom. As momentum builds around this pedagogical approach, elementary school teachers encounter similar barriers. This study examined Canadian

elementary school teachers' perspectives of barriers they encountered, along with specific supports which made outdoor learning more accessible. You can access the entire study here. And you can read a research summary of the study here.

There are four main themes that emerged from the data. Identified themes overlap one another in influence and impact in relationship to how teachers navigate both barriers and opportunities for outdoor learning. The first considers teacher characteristics, including a teacher's confidence, skills, experience, and commitment for leading children in nature. Teachers also expressed varying levels of motivation to try teaching outdoors, particularly if they did not have extensive experience outdoors in their own childhood. Teacher

characteristics are often nested in a broader theme of culture. School culture is affected by broader societal beliefs, and families who deliver their children to school, offer their own culture of origin to the conversation of where and how learning happens. In my experience, teachers who are keen to try teaching outdoors, or want to support colleagues unsure where to start, can almost always



overcome barriers associated with these two themes by networking with colleagues in a professional learning community. In British Columbia, teachers are encouraged to join the Environmental Educators' Provincial Specialist Association (EEPSA) and everyone is welcome to network online through conference offerings and free webinars at The Outdoor Learning Store.

The most common challenge expressed by teachers engaged in outdoor learning continues to be inclement or extreme weather. Beyond the weather, environmental issues (like proximity to natural hazards, or campus proximity to wild spaces, and whether decision makers prioritize funding for outdoor learning spaces) all determine the ease with which teachers can access outdoor learning regularly from their assigned classrooms. Environmental issues are often nested within an inconsistent system of schooling that actively works to create or remove barriers for outdoor learning. Examples include having school administrators who are supported by the school district with exploration friendly walking field trip policies, targeted funding for outdoor learning at the school, district and provincial levels, and a ministry curriculum which is flexible enough

to be mapped onto nature play experiences. Other examples include developing gear lending libraries to equitably outfit learners who might not come to school prepared for inclement weather. The infographic below provides further examples of how these issues can both help and hinder access to outdoor learning in our schools.

The best advice experienced educators offer for colleagues who wish to try teaching outdoors includes solid communication with your school community. Be sure principals, families and learners are clear on your intentions, and work to make learning visible to ensure complex and emergent learning is documented. Secondly, schedule plenty of time for outdoor learning. Time is the magical ingredient in this work, and daily interactions with nature increase meaningful opportunities for learning. Finally, have fun with it! Get messy, make lots of mistakes, and enjoy relationships that grow in unexpected ways when we disrupt the power hierarchy of our classrooms!
